Zone Five Update by Jon Jones

For a bit of a departure this month, let's take a look at the PCA insurance program.

We are fortunate to have an insurance program, negotiated annually with various carriers, that allows us the opportunity to hold all of those wonderful events we love from tours or drives, to autocross, Driver's Education and Club Racing. Each of these *moving* car events must have an insurance certificate issued for each individual event.

Pop quiz – What's a "moving car" event? Answer – any event in which a car is physically moving, indoors or out-of-doors, during the course of the event. For example, a tech session during which a car is on a lift is considered a moving car event. A concours is *not* considered a moving car event since the cars have ceased moving before the event begins.

Now back to the topic. Here's how the process works: At least three weeks prior to the event, the event chair, or other responsible party, completes the online form at PCA.org to apply for the insurance certificate. The form requires dates, times, locations, start and end points and other pertinent information. The National Office then completes the certificate and sends it to the responsible party or parties. This certificate is the *official record* of who, what, when and where the insurance is in effect. This is very important – any deviation from the dates/times/locations as stated on the certificate likely means that the certificate is invalid and the participants are NOT covered.

Look at the new tour standards that were just issued. If someone leaves the tour group and/or route on their own decision, they are no longer covered by PCA insurance. That is because they are no longer on the designated route as published and explained at the driver's meeting.

The insurance process is also a "closed loop" process. Here's why – at the completion of the event, the event chair completes a post-event report with some basic information. More importantly, a designated person also completes an Observer's Report. Combined, these reports provide feedback on the event, but also show the insurance company that we are providing due diligence in conducting our events by adhering to our own standards and procedures. The observer's report guidelines require the designated filler-outer to be someone not affiliated with the organization or conduct of the event. Why? Simple. We need an *independent* report of the event. One that will tell us, and the insurance company, how the event went, warts and all. *(cont. next page)*

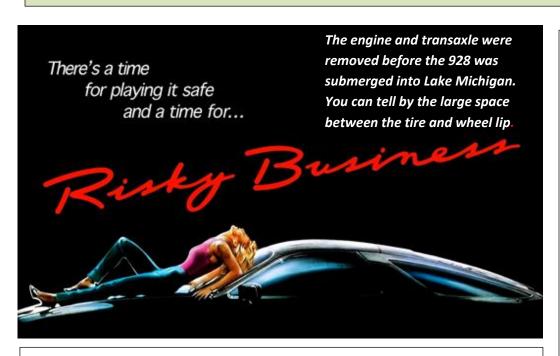

After Sherri and I attended the Fall 2015 ESCAPE in Rapid City, we were hooked and vowed to go again. A nice hotel, great cars, interesting people, awesome scenery, and lots of food made for a memorable weekend. The format is much like our Palooza, which allow participants to select their drives and activities. That trip proved our ability to enjoy a road trip together in a great car. The Cayenne cruised effortlessly at 85-

90 mph for hours across the S. Dakota landscape. When the Treffen concept was introduced with both a spring and fall event, it became a no brainer to go again, this time to Austin in the Cayman.



Wednesday:

After packing carefully, both

front and back of the Cayman was full with little extra space. We left at 7:00 am and headed south through Oklahoma to Dallas. After a lunch stop in Plano, we found our way through downtown Dallas to I35 South thanks to the Porsche navigation and iPhone maps. 10 hrs later, with 3 stops, we arrived at Hyatt Lost Pines Resort 20 min east of Austin In time to register and grab a bite at the welcome reception. The place was buzzing with Porsches and their smiling, friendly owners.

Thursday:

Up early again, after a hearty breakfast, we were lined up at 7:30 for the drive to the Texas Hill Country SW of Austin. Lunch was at Gruene (Green), a funky Eureka Springs-like, town. We visited with a Vietnamese IBM super computer designer and a bold, east coast self-made businessman who had traveled both to Europe and the Far East promoting his company. He went on about how his Cayenne rode poorly on 21 in wheels, so he got a Macan on 19 in wheels instead. Everyone always talks freely about Their families, travels and of course, their cars. The drive back included about 15 min at 90+ mph on a rural toll road. But the best was yet to come. The evening event was a COTA (Circuit of the Americas)

Formula 1 Grand Prix is held. I had been anticipating this for weeks. I had grown up watching Formula 1 on TV, following drivers such as Hunt, Lauda, Andretti, Hill and others. The chance to be at and drive on this track was un-



believable. After a catered reception overlooking the track, the cars were lined up on pit row in groups of about 40. Top speed was limited to 70 mph.

It is a road course of about 3.4 mi, with several tight turns ad changing elevations. The exit from pit row is uphill to turn 1. Then it falls to the left downhill followed by a tight chicane. After 4 laps, my heart was pounding out of my chest with excitement. I found out that driving is a full body experience requiring full focus and concentration. Sherri was a real trooper, holding the camera and not freaking out. I wasn't sure she would ride with me although she closed her eyes on the last lap. The Cayman was right at home on the track, never flinching in the corners. It was hard to keep up with the 911 ahead of me, but I gained ground in the turns. DE is a must for me now at Hallett. I'm hooked.

Friday:

Friday morning we went into downtown Austin to meet a business consultant and have lunch on S.Congress Ave. That area is well known for funky shops and food trucks. Friday evening's event was a 4 course Tapas dinner outside on an expansive deck on the



Lost Pines grounds. The resort is a relaxing oasis away from the big city hustle. The grounds are like a botanical gardens of local flora. Everything was in full bloom for spring. More interesting conversations followed after dinner.

Saturday:

Another early morning drive through the Hill Country was followed by an

Italian lunch at a local winery. The Hill Country is a scenic mix of cactus, mesquite, rolling hills and winding roads perfect for Porsches. There we met an unassuming retired navy pilot who now is a driver for an IMSA team that races at Daytona, Sebring, etc. A retired couple

from Colorado who are veterans of the club racing circuit in a Boxster told about their exploits. By then end of lunch we were invited to their RV at Hallett for Octoberfast. PCA really attracts such great folks. Saturday night was a western barbeque complete with line dancing to a Texas style band. A real live Longhorn and Llama provided photo ops.



Sunday:

We were ready and loaded before daylight for the drive back home. In the parking lot was a Cayenne with a trailer loaded with a late model 911. That is traveling in style. Who needs a 1 ton pickup to pull a trailer! 2 stops and 9.5 hours later we arrived back to the real world. We had driven 1520 mi, saw a lot of new sights, an array of Porsches, and thoroughly enjoyed riding in our Cayman. Everything in the cockpit is so



ergonomically arranged, a long drive becomes an event in itself.

PCA does a great job on these events. But it is the local volunteers that make it happen, just as in our own Palooza. These national events still have not eclipsed Palooza in the number of cars registered.

Porsche Trivia

The Porsche logo/crest was designed in 1952 on Dr. Ferry Porsche's napkin as he sat opposite U.S. importer Max Hoffman in a New York restaurant.

In the original 356 Speedster, a tachometer was not standard, nor were padded seats, sun visors or heaters. The first Porsche to appear at the New York Auto Show was in 1954 and was called "a snappy Porsche roadster."

The Porsche Club of America was founded in 1955, only five years after Porsche was introduced to the United States. The inaugural Porsche Parade took place in greater Washington D.C. on August 29, 1956.

The first American citizen to win a Formula One Championship victory at a U.S. track while driving a Porsche was Dan Gurney in 1961.

Porsche was the first auto manufacturer to make passenger air bags available, optional or standard.

The names for both the 911 Carrera and the new Panamera Gran Turismo came from Mexico's historic Carrera Panamericana race, where Porsche scored many victories.

Notable past and current American celebrities who are or were Porsche enthusiasts include James Dean, Paul Newman, Steve McQueen, Ralph Lauren, Jerry Seinfeld, Jay Leno, and Patrick Dempsey.

Memo from Jon Jones, Zone 5 Representative

Subject: Driving Tour Minimum Standards

All, PCA is beginning the process of rolling out the new Driving Tour Minimum Standards. These standards have been under development for a while, and we are ready to implement them. For background, tours are much more frequent events than DE or Club Race events, and accordingly they are the most prone to incidents. Since they do require insurance, we need to establish a set of minimum standards, just as we have done for autocross and other moving car events.

The EC's position on these standards is that they are in effect now, and we should be using them. The comment and feedback period will continue until 12/31/17, and we invite feedback and input.

Please review and forward any comments/concerns to me and I will forward them, unfiltered, up to the EC. Ed note. The standards follow the last page of the newsletter.



Tour Guidelines by Dave Decker

As mentioned earlier, I was the tour leader for Ausflug SWM. It was my first attempt at doing a tour for the club. I've been a ride "captain" for the motorcycle bunch of rowdies I run with but we're a little less structured than PCA. The PCA tour rules are very explicit —

- 1. Start with a tour leader. He/she is responsible for everything related to the tour.
- Hold a safety/drivers briefing before leaving. At this time distribute route instructions and have everyone sign the waiver. All drivers must be 18 years old or older. The instructions should have the tour leader's cell phone number.
- 3. Appoint a sweeper before leaving. This is the last car in the group and is responsible for advising the tour leader if anyone has separated from the group, mechanical issues and unsafe driving.
- 4. Safety is important. Drive with headlights on. Obey speed limits and traffic laws. A tour is not a competitive event. This means no passing the tour leader and the group should only pass non-motorized vehicles and pedestrians.
- 5. Maintain a safe distance between cars, a car length for every 10 mph.
- 6. Participants that intentionally separate themselves from the group are no longer covered under the PCA insurance.

Doing the tour was fun and I learned several things to do to make the next tour I lead is better. You should try it!. If you have an idea for a tour or want to organize one contact one of the club officers. Their emails are in the newletter or contact me at wrrnews@gmail.com.

PCA MINIMUM DRIVING TOUR STANDARDS

The purpose of the PCA Minimum Driving Tour Standards is to provide each Region with the foundation on which to build their own Region Driving Tour program. These Standards were designed to be minimal in nature so that any Region can have more stringent rules, but no Region shall have any that are more lenient. Any Region conducting a driving tour must meet all the Minimum Driving Tour Standards. Definitions are included below and are part of these Standards.

DEFINITIONS

■ **Driving Tour:** A driving tour is an organized event in which participants gather at a start point defined on the PCA event insurance certificate. All participants sign liability waivers and depart in a group or groups consisting of both a lead and a sweeper car(s) driving the specified route, ending in a group or groups at the location identified on the insurance certificate. PCA coverage is only in effect for the route defined by the start and end point on the insurance certificate and driven by the participants who have signed waivers for that driving tour. Participants who intentionally separate themselves from the group are considered to have left the driving tour and may no longer be covered under PCA insurance.

Note 1: If your Region conducts driving tour events that meet this definition and you do not obtain a Certificate of Insurance and collect waivers, then your event, Region, Region's officers, you and PCA may not be covered by insurance and all may be exposed to potential liability in the event of an incident.

Note 2: If your Region conducts driving tour events that do not meet this definition, even if you obtain a Certificate of Insurance and collect waivers, then your event may not be covered by PCA's insurance.

- **Tour Leader:** This person is responsible for the overall planning and execution of the driving tour. This includes coordinating the tour start point, end point, rest stops, etc. Additionally, the tour leader is responsible for ensuring an adequate participant safety briefing is conducted in accordance with these Minimum Driving Tour Standards.
- Group Leader: For driving tours with multiple groups, the group leader(s) are responsible
 for leading their respective groups in compliance with all instructions outlined by the tour
 leader and all Minimum Driving Tour Standards.
- **Sweeper:** Also called the trailing or following car, the sweeper is the car at the tail end of the tour or group. The sweeper's duties include assisting any tour vehicle that pulled over, advising the tour/group leader if vehicles became separated from the group and advising the tour/group leader about any unsafe driving practices by a tour participant so the tour/group leader(s) can take appropriate action.
- **Insurance Certificate:** The official liability insurance certificate issued by PCA showing the insurance coverage, date of the event, and the start and end points for the event.

- Waiver Forms: The official forms that protect PCA and the event organizers as listed in the waiver form from being sued by the participants in the event of an incident. "Release and Waiver of Liability" forms for both adults and minors are published on the PCA.org website and in the Region Procedures Manual (RPM).
- **Tour Route:** Each driving tour follows a specified route as planned by the tour leader and documented in the written (or electronic) driving directions.

PCA MINIMUM DRIVING TOUR STANDARDS

Waivers and Insurance

- A PCA liability insurance certificate shall be requested from PCA National on the insurance request form published on PCA.org and in the RPM. A hard copy shall be available when participants check in and carried by the tour leader on the tour.
- o Notify PCA National within 24 hours if a tour is cancelled.
- o Notify PCA National prior to the tour date if the start or end location is changed.
- o There shall be an established method to ensure ALL participants sign the waiver(s) and receive the safety briefing prior to tour start. If other participants join the route at an intermediate point or start from an alternate location, they shall also sign the waiver form(s) and receive a safety briefing prior to tour participation.
- At least one parent/guardian shall sign the "Minors as Observers Only Form" for each participant under the age of 18, if applicable.
- o Driving tours shall use the colored version of the waiver forms (with the red type).
- o All drivers shall be at least 18 years old.

Tour Conduct

- It is assumed each participating driver possesses a current driver's license and automobile liability insurance.
- The tour/group leader shall conduct a formal participant/safety briefing for all tour participants prior to driving tour departure, including all items specified in the safety briefing section below.
- The cell phone numbers of all tour/group leaders and sweepers shall be provided to all participants.
- As a minimum, route directions shall be provided to those tour participants whose primary duty is to safely navigate the tour route.
- o Each tour shall have an assigned leader per group and a minimum of one sweeper car.
- Each tour/group leader and sweeper shall have a safe method of communicating within the group in compliance with local laws.
- For tour groups that cannot maintain visual contact within the group, each tour/group leader and sweeper car shall have a minimum of two occupants for the purpose of conducting safe/legal communications.
- o The tour shall be conducted in compliance with speed limits and all other traffic laws.
- Participants who intentionally separate themselves from the group before the tour
 destination are no longer considered part of the tour and may no longer be covered
 under PCA insurance.

Post-Event Reporting

- o All post event reporting shall be completed using the online forms on PCA.org.
- The tour leader shall complete and submit the Post Event Report to PCA within five (5) days.
- The tour leader shall assign someone who is not involved in planning or running the event to complete and submit the Observers Report to PCA within ten (10) days.
- The tour leader shall complete and submit an Incident Report to PCA, if needed, within five (5) business days (the next business day if bodily injury is involved).

A Region's repeated failure to comply with the Minimum Standards after warnings of noncompliance or refusal to adhere to these Standards could prevent the Region from obtaining PCA insurance for future driving tour events.

MINIMUM SAFETY BRIEFING FOR TOURS

Tour/group leaders are in charge of conducting a safe driving tour. As a minimum, the following points shall be communicated during the safety briefing for all participants prior to tour departure:

- Introduce all tour/group leader(s) and sweeper(s) and identify their cars.
- Have all tour participants signed the relevant waiver form(s)?
- Safety is paramount. Driving tours are NOT competitive or high speed driving events.
 Individual drivers are responsible for operating their own vehicle safely.
- It is assumed that each participating driver has a current driver's license and automobile liability insurance. PCA also provides liability insurance that covers PCA, the Region, the event organizers and each participant while on the tour. If you intentionally separate yourself from the group, you may not be covered by this insurance.
- Obey speed limits and all other traffic laws.
- The driving directions contain details about the route, rest stops and any safety concerns or areas where the tour may have to slow to maintain safety. [Review any specific areas of concern in the driving directions.]
- No passing the tour/group leader(s). They set the pace.
- Pass non-motorized traffic and pedestrians SLOWLY, giving a wide berth.
- Leave a safe distance between cars, generally at least 2-3 seconds behind the car in front, or one car length for every 10MPH.
- If you become separated from the group, inform the driving tour/group leader or sweeper and obey all posted speed limits and other traffic laws until you rejoin the group.
- Drive with headlights on to increase visibility to other cars.
- In an emergency, pull over, stop in a safe location, turn on emergency flashers and advise the tour/group sweeper.

- The sweeper plays an important support role and shall advise the tour/group leader of any issues within the group.
- Responsibility for maintaining PCA's excellent history of safe and enjoyable events rests with each participant. Have fun and be safe!
